## MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends and Members,

We are pleased to present the 2007 annual report. 2007 was a productive year in the history of Preservation Maryland. In the pages that follow, you will read about our ongoing work to preserve Maryland's historic buildings, neighborhoods, landscapes and archeological sites. Preservation Maryland is the lead advocate and leading source of outreach and technical assistance for historic preservation in the state. Our many accomplishments would not be possible without the ongoing support of you, our donors and members. Thank you!

2007 marked the end of a year long celebration of Preservation Maryland's 75th anniversary. At the annual meeting in November, we unveiled our new publication, *75 Years with Preservation Maryland – Saving the Past, Shaping the Future*. This commemorative publication was made possible by a France-Merrick Foundation challenge grant and the substantial support from our donors, and highlights the history of the preservation movement in Maryland.

A tribute to the people and achievements that have brought us to where we are today, this history will serve as the focal point for a series of initiatives designed to increase Preservation Maryland's organizational capacity, build a broader base of support, and carry our mission to an even wider constituency.

Every year at the annual meeting, Preservation Maryland recognizes deserving individuals who have made important contributions to preservation efforts within the state of Maryland. In 2007, the President's Award was presented to Charles L. Wagandt for his 35 years of outstanding commitment and leadership to preserving Maryland's rich and diverse heritage, specifically in Baltimore County. For the outstanding rehabilitation of the Hampton Historic National Site, the National Park Service, Constellation Energy and GWWO Architects were presented the Stewardship Award, and the George T. Harrison Award was presented to Julia K O'Malley for her dedication to preserving the history of Montgomery County.

As part of the 75th celebration, Preservation Maryland held two regional events in 2007 to help strengthen our support and raise our profile throughout the state. An event in Southern Maryland was hosted by Maggie O'Brien & Jim Grube and held at Woodlawn Inn in St. Mary's County. The Tilghman family, hosted the Eastern Shore event at Wye House in Talbot County done in partnership with Eastern Shore Land Conservancy. Through these two well attended events, we increased our presence within the regions and reaffirmed our relationship with local partners in those areas.


*75 Years with Preservation Maryland: Saving the Past, Shaping the Future*

In 2007 Preservation Maryland, together with the Maryland Historical Trust, again planned and held a successful annual Preservation & Revitalization Conference. This year, the conference was held in Chestertown, one of the National Trust for Historic Preservation's Dozen Distinctive Destinations. Washington College and the Town of Chestertown opened their doors to more than 400 preservationists from across Maryland. This conference showcased the rich traditions of the Eastern Shore, while providing tools and resources for participants from throughout the state to take home to implement in their communities.

Also in 2007, Preservation Maryland, in partnership with Maryland Life, proudly announced Endangered Maryland, a new program designed to create awareness of some of the state's most threatened historic and cultural sites. Endangered lists have effectively focused public attention, rallied together local residents, community organizations, civic leaders, and preservation professionals to help save a threatened site. A list of the designated sites is included in this annual report. Many of these threatened properties have benefited from the publicity generated from this program and have been successfully protected. In early 2008, we released the second Endangered Maryland list in the March-April edition of Maryland Life magazine. The program has become an effective tool to generate public awareness of Maryland's significant threatened historic properties and serves as a call for action.

Preservation Maryland faces many challenges in protecting and preserving Maryland's treasured heritage. Our plans for the future are ambitious, but within our reach. In the upcoming months, we are launching one of our new initiatives: the expansion of field staff. The National Trust for Historic Preservation recently awarded Preservation Maryland a 3-year challenge grant to help fund the expansion of field services on the Eastern Shore in Maryland. We are well on our way to meet our fundraising goals but still need to secure additional funding before hiring our new field staff in the fall of 2008. We hope you will help us!

Preservation Maryland is proud to be one of the oldest and most distinguished statewide preservation organizations in the county. Our 75 years have given us the expertise, the grassroots networks, and the momentum to confront the threats to Maryland's heritage, but to be successful, we need your help. Together we can continue to **protect the irreplaceable** in Maryland.

- Preservation Maryland continues to organize the Maryland Coordinating Council which works to ensure sufficient appropriations for the Heritage Tax Credit, the Maryland Historical Trust grant programs, the Maryland Heritage Area Authority, the Maryland Humanities Council, and the IMPART program. This important agenda was promoted through regular advocacy alerts that educated and activated members on state and federal legislative issues. PM also provided testimony for hearings in Annapolis.

In January 2007, PM co-sponsored the Legislative Breakfast at the Banneker-Douglass Museum in Annapolis, drawing more than 130 people. *House Speaker Michael Busch offered remarks* and State Delegates and Senators met constituents and had the opportunity to review information on programs offered by the various groups including fact-sheets and case-statements for many of the key points of the preservation agenda.

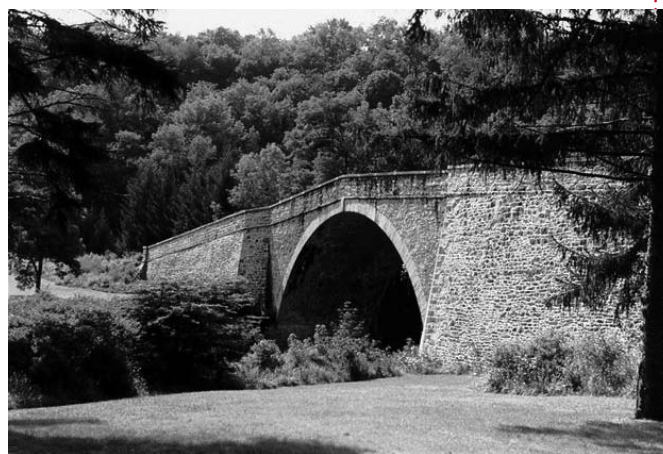

PM helped to develop state legislative and budget agenda and worked for the passage of the following items:

#### Budget Items:

- \$25 million for commercial projects under the Rehabilitation Tax Credit program (the residential program remains a true tax credit and does not require a budget appropriation)
- \$3 million for the Maryland Heritage Area Authority to support the state's 13 Certified and Recognized Heritage Areas
- \$1.25 million for operational support for history museums through the Museum Assistance Program
- \$700,000 for capital grant funding for historic preservation projects
- \$500,000 for non-capital grant funding for historic preservation projects
- \$200,000 for IMPART grants to fund graduate level internships and assistantships for students in archaeology, museum studies and historic preservation
- \$107,000 for support of the Maryland Humanities Council

#### Legislative Items:

- Rehabilitation Tax Credit Bill – Extends program to June 2010, increased single jurisdiction limit to 75%, removed mandated \$30 million budget appropriation.

- PM held the 2007 Preservation & Revitalization Conference on May 31-June 1 in Chestertown. The event was attended by nearly 400 people. The plenary session featured welcoming remarks from Mayor Margo Bailey followed by an address by Steve Zeitlin from Place Matters, New York City. The sessions offered at the Preservation & Revitalization Conference explored the distinct character of the Eastern Shore, gave practical tools for preservation efforts and offered ideas to create successful partnerships between preservation organizations, heritage organizations, and local and state governments.

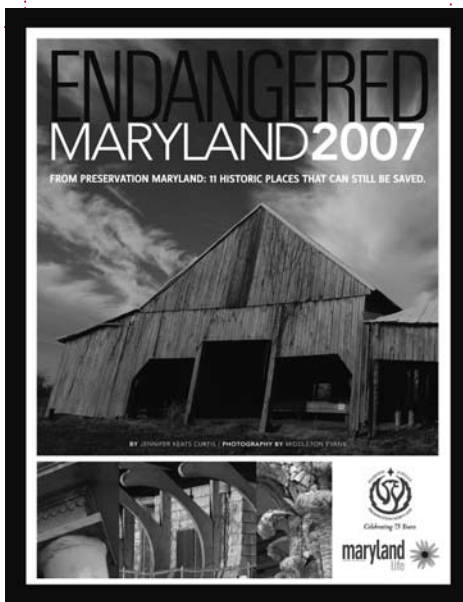
2007 saw the continued growth of the Colleagues program. Preservation Maryland provided regular e-newsletters of statewide and national preservation news, events, and funding opportunities to our Colleagues members throughout Maryland. In addition, workshops were offered in Easton and Baltimore City on “historic window repair”. Workshops were also offered on the “staying relevant” and “disaster preparation”. These workshops were open to Colleagues and others in the nonprofit community.

The annual Michael F. Trostel Preservation Lecture, in partnership with AIA Baltimore, was held in March 2007. Ms. Julia Gersovitz, Auxiliary Professor of Design at McGill University in Canada, teaches courses on historic preservation, design in historic districts, and the history of architecture in Canada. Ms. Gersovitz addressed the idea that the building is an equal stakeholder in every project, as well as the client, the community and the architect. Her designs reflected sensitivity to the needs of the community as well as to the unique character each building.

PM cosponsor Maryland’s Annual House and Garden Tour and serve on steering committee

PM Continued partnership with the Maryland Historic Trust on the Buildings of Maryland book project, part of the Society of Architectural Historians Buildings of the United States series. The resulting publication will feature HABS/HARS photographs of significant Maryland historic buildings.

PM proudly inaugurated Endangered Maryland, in partnership with Maryland Life Magazine. This new program draws attention to historic sites, properties, and resources that are under threat from development, neglect, and deterioration. The eleven sites, selected by a panel of preservation efforts from across the state, represent the variety of valuable historic and cultural resources that are in danger of being lost. PM has successfully helped to identify potential solutions to protect these important endangered sites.

**Aberdeen Train Station** .....

Designed by Frank Furness, founder of the Philadelphia School of Architecture and Unused by railroad since 1960, the building has fallen into disrepair and was condemned by the city of Aberdeen in 2003. The railroad has placed a temporary halt to demolition, but the train station is on the verge of being sold.



**Barnes Road Bridge**.....

Located in a pristine setting on a 13 acre property, Keedy House is considered one of the finest examples of German architecture south of Pennsylvania. Washington County has budgeted funds to replace the bridge with an un-necessary two lane bridge, and to widen the road in both directions, risking the rural landscape.



**Bond-Simms Tobacco Barn** .....

The 19th century historic tobacco barn is believed to be the oldest hewn log barn in the county. Although additions have helped to protect the original structure, which still stands on its original timbers and log walls, there is a large amount of water and termite damage that threatens the barn's survival



**Bucktown Store** .....

Located on the site of a significant event in the life of Harriet Tubman, the Bucktown Store is an example of 19th century, rural, mercantile architecture, largely unchanged or un-modernized from 19th-century appearance. Structural integrity is threatened do to neglect and deterioration. The threat of encroaching development from nearby Blackwater Development and increased traffic threaten the property.



**COMSAT Laboratories** .....

Designed by Cesar Pelli in 1969. This building is considered a significant example of the developing work of one of the most influential architects of the post-WWII era. The property owner has expressed intention for intense development of the campus would substantially damage the buildings context and the important visual impact of the site on the I-270 corridor. The building itself may or may not remain.



### **Doughoregan Manor**

Located on 890 acres of prime agricultural and environmental land in Howard County – the MHT easement on the home of Charles Carroll the Signer is set to expire in 2007. Development of the property to raise money for repairs to the historic plantation would destroy the context of the historic structures..



### **Lonaconing Silk Mill**

The only remaining silk mill in the United States with its machinery, company records and workers' personal effects remaining unchanged from the time that the factory ceased operations in 1957. The owner is seeking to divest himself of what has become a substantial financial burden. Without immediate attention, the mill is in danger of irreversible



### **Ridgeley Rosenwald School**

Built in 1929, the Ridgeley school is the closest of any of the remaining nine Prince George's County Rosenwald Schools. Though usable, the building is in need of substantial repairs. Changes to zoning threatens the context and environment of the site and limiting the ability to use the building for a museum and community center.



### **St. Peter's Cemetery**

Encroaching vegetation threatens the majority of the 23 acre property, and tombstones risk being overgrown, damaged and irretrievably lost. The changing demographics of the neighborhood means that the local community has little or no interest in the cemetery or its maintenance. Without immediate attention, the cemetery will be completely lost.



### **Sellers Mansion**

The only detached private residence in the predominantly African-American neighborhood of Lafayette Square, the Sellers Mansion has stood neglected since the late 1990s. Although alternate uses have been proposed, they have been rejected by the neighborhood. Without proper attention, the structure faces substantial deterioration.



### **Wallace Office Building**

Built in 1852, this building is believed to be the oldest surviving building in Cambridge, and is a prominent part of the Cambridge Main Street. Severe dry rot in the floor beams and rising damp in the stucco-over-masonry walls exist and worsen. Unless conditions are corrected the building will demand major reconstruction rather than preservation.



*The Heritage Fund supports preservation projects and organizations through grants that are awarded for a variety of purposes - from emergency repairs to case studies - and range from \$500 to \$5,000. The Heritage Fund provides direct assistance for the protection of endangered cultural resources and promotes innovative demonstration projects that can be successfully replicated to meet Maryland's historic preservation needs. The Fund is intended to serve the needs of tangible cultural resources in Maryland that are not likely to be met through existing Preservation Maryland and Maryland Historical Trust programs. Along with historic sites, buildings, districts, and objects, projects benefiting archaeological resources are eligible for funding.*

HERITAGE FUND AWARDS

**PRESERVATION MARYLAND -  
LONACONING  
(ALLEGANY COUNTY)**  
\$1,000

Awarded a \$1000 grant to assist with the costs of hiring a consultant to prepare a conditions assessment for the Klotz Throwing Mill in Lonaconing. The structure is a remarkably intact early 20th century silk throwing mill complete with collections of machinery and records that have not been altered since the mill closed in 1957. The mill was recently listed on Preservation Maryland's "Endangered Maryland" list.

**CITY OF ANNAPOLIS  
(ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY)**  
\$2,000

Awarded a \$2000 grant to The City of Annapolis to contribute to the costs of preparing an Historic Structures Report for Annapolis City Hall. The earliest parts of the building date to 1767 although it has been significantly modified and expanded. The Annapolis City Hall is significant for its association with early state and federal government activity. The City plans to restore the interior of the building to its 1867 condition to match the exterior.

**GALESVILLE COMMUNITY CENTER  
ORGANIZATION, INC.  
(ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY)**  
\$4,000

Awarded a \$4000 grant to the Galesville Community Center Organization, Inc. to support a conservation assessment of the Galesville Rosenwald School. The Galesville School is one of the few remaining Rosenwald Schools (built between 1913 and 1932 to educate African American children with the support of Julius Rosenwald of Sears and Roebuck) in Anne Arundel County. Funding assisted with the costs of hosting a conference promoting the value of historic preservation in Carroll County.

**HISTORIC ANNAPOLIS FOUNDATION  
(ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY)**  
\$1,000

Awarded a \$1000 grant to the Historic Annapolis Foundation to assist with the cost of organizational strategic planning. Heritage Funds will be used for consultants' fees resulting in organizational assessment, a Board retreat, and development of a new strategic plan.

**GARRETT-JACOBS MANSION  
ENDOWMENT FUND  
(BALTIMORE CITY)**  
\$1,000

Awarded a \$1000 grant to The Garrett-Jacobs Mansion Endowment fund in support of the restoration of the drawing room at the Garrett-Jacobs Mansion. The Garrett-Jacobs Mansion, designed by Stanford White and John Russell Pope, is a contributing structure to the Mt. Vernon Place Historic District, a National Historic Landmark. The Drawing Room will be restored to its 1916 appearance.

NEIGHBORHOODS OF GREATER  
LAURAVILLE  
(BALTIMORE CITY)

\$2,500

Awarded a \$2500 grant to the Neighborhoods of Greater Lauraville in support of a series of training sessions to introduce residents of the historic neighborhoods of Northeast Baltimore to the Maryland Heritage Preservation Tax Credits. The neighborhoods of Arcadia, Beverly Hills, Lauraville, and Mayfield are listed on the National Register but have seen few residential tax credit projects since their listing.

SOCIETY OF THE PRESERVATION OF  
FEDERAL HILL AND FELL'S POINT, INC.  
(BALTIMORE CITY)

\$3,000

Awarded a \$3,000 grant to the Preservation Society to assist with the cost of an assessment of their museum properties through the Conservation Assessment Program (CAP) and the implementation of the recommendations of the assessment. Historic properties to be evaluated through CAP include an 18th century wooden caulker's residence, an intact bordello and wooden schoolhouse recently donated to the Preservation Society, the Robert Long House, and a merchant's house from the early 19th century.

ST. JOHN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH, WAVERLY  
(BALTIMORE CITY)

\$4,000

Awarded a \$4000 grant to St. John's Episcopal Church of Waverly in support of masonry repairs to the steeple of St. John's Church. The church, a gothic revival structure that dates to 1860, is listed on the National Register. While the church is very well maintained, several leaks around the steeple have resulted in serious damage to interior woodwork and plaster.

ST. PATRICK'S CHAPEL HISTORICAL SOCIETY  
(CECIL COUNTY)

\$3,000

Awarded a \$3000 grant to The St. Patrick's Chapel Historical Society to assist with the cost of restoring St. Patrick's Chapel in Conowingo, Cecil County. St. Patrick's was built in 1819 by Irish immigrants and retains a high degree of architectural integrity.

NANTICOKE HISTORIC PRESERVATION  
ALLIANCE, INC.  
(DORCHESTER COUNTY)

\$3,200

Awarded a \$3200 grant to the Nanticoke Historic Preservation Alliance, Inc. in support of architectural documentation of Handsell to be performed by the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS). Handsell is an important example of a Georgian planter's home near the Nanticoke River.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF HARFORD  
COUNTY, INC.  
(HARFORD COUNTY)

\$3,000

Awarded a \$3000 grant to the Historical Society of Harford County to assist with the cost of emergency roof repairs and security improvements at the Aberdeen B & O Railroad Station. The Historical Society has worked with the building's owner (CSX) for several years to find a preservation-friendly future for the station, which was designed by Frank Furness in 1885.

**THE LAUREL MUSEUM  
(PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY)**  
\$2,500

Awarded a \$2500 grant to the Laurel Museum to contribute to the cost of hiring a consultant to create a long range plan for the Laurel Historical Society and Museum. The Historical Society and Museum maintains and occupies an 1830s structure that was built as mill worker housing. The Museum focuses on the unique history of Laurel with a focus on its industrial heritage.

**ST. MARK'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH, LAPPANS  
(WASHINGTON COUNTY)**  
\$3,500

St. Mark's Church was awarded a grant in support of roof repairs to the belfry of the church. St. Mark's, a small gothic revival church near Boonesboro, was built in 1849 and is individually listed on the National Register. The current repair is needed to protect the bell and its support beam.

**RACKLIFFE HOUSE TRUST  
(WORCESTER COUNTY)**  
\$4,000

Awarded a \$4000 grant to the Rackliffe House Trust to assist with the cost of retaining an architectural historian to ensure the appropriate restoration of Rackliffe House, a plantation house constructed in 1752 on Assawoman Bay near Berlin. The house has been repeatedly damaged by fire and neglect. The Rackliffe House Trust aims to restore the structure and its outbuildings to their 18th century appearance.

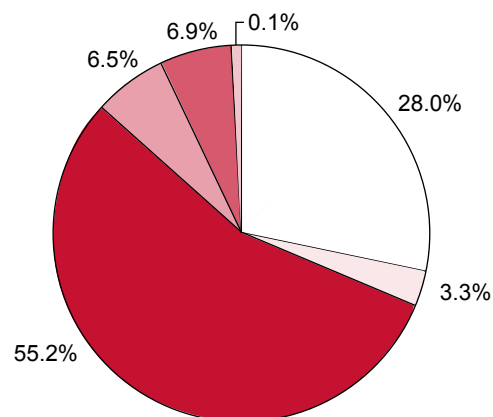

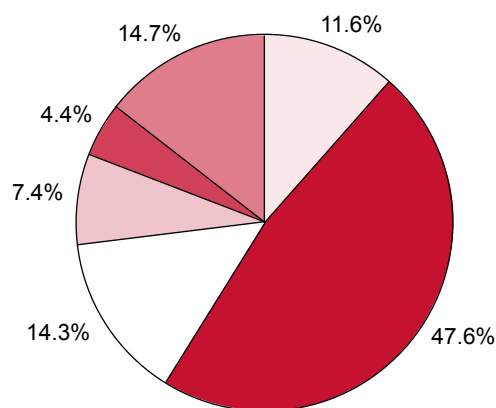

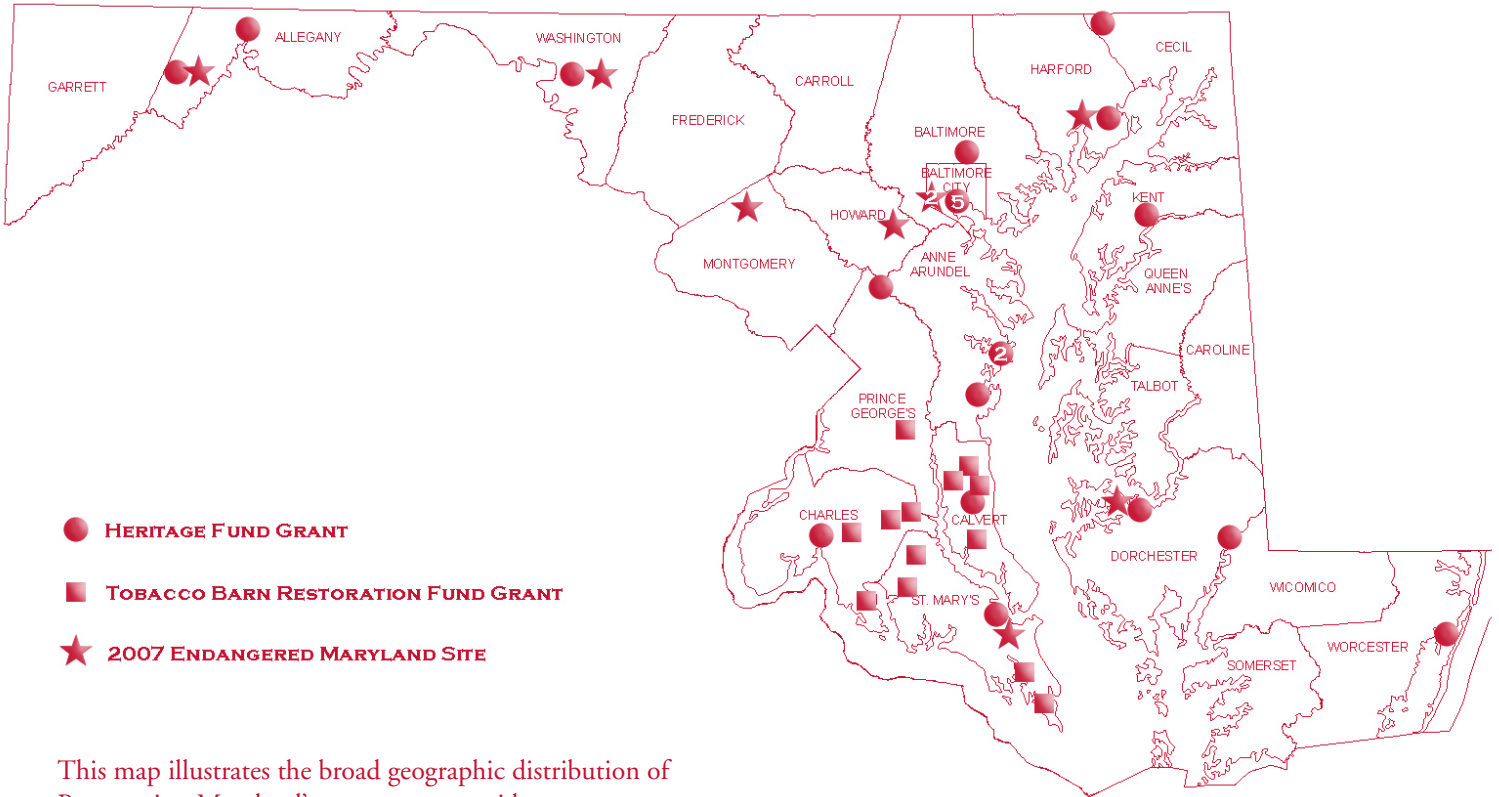
