REGIONAL EVENT HELD at HISTORIC ROCKLAND

On April 19th, over 180 guests enjoyed a luncheon and tour of Rockland, a three-story stone Federal-style house located in Washington County. This rare opportunity to visit Rockland was made possible by hosts Mike Moreland and Jason Daisey, who graciously opened their home and prepared a delicious buffet lunch for the guests. We could not have found a more perfect setting in which to highlight Rockland and the importance of historic preservation. The event helped raise awareness about historic preservation and make new friends for Preservation Maryland.

Rockland, one of the most significant historic properties in Washington County, was built in 1803 by Colonel Frisby Tilghman (1773-1847), son of Maryland's first Attorney General, James Tilghman. Originally over 1,100 acres, Rockland was the largest slave-holding estates in the county. It was home to James W. C. Pennington, who apprenticed as a slave stonemason and blacksmith before escaping in 1827. He later wrote his autobiography, *The Fugitive Blacksmith*, which has been called one of the most important slave narratives in our history. *(continued on page 2)*

Hagerstown Hosts the 2008 Preservation and Revitalization Conference

THE PRESERVATION AND REVITALIZATION CONFERENCE was held for the first time in Hagerstown on May 29 and 30. Nearly 400 attendees from throughout Maryland and surrounding states attended. The conference featured 50 separate events, including on-site educational sessions, off-site walking tours and bus tours, hands-on workshops, affinity luncheons, and receptions.

Educational sessions featured topics designed to appeal to a broad cross-section of preservation related volunteers and professionals. There were sessions that focused on the needs of historic district commissioners, city and county planners, preservation educators, Main Streets, architects and public historians, among other groups. A special focus was placed on downtown revitalization, smart growth and green preservation. In between sessions, attendees were able to visit 24 exhibit displays featuring Preservation related goods and services from across the state.

The annual advocacy luncheon presented participants with a review of statewide preservation efforts, including a recap of the 2008 General Assembly session. Affinity meals for Main Street Maryland, Maryland Heritage Areas, and the Maryland Association of Historic District Commissions provided each group the opportunity to update their members on their activities and share this information with other interested attendees.

The plenary session, featuring Ed McMahon of the Urban Land Institute, drove home key issues of preservation and its role in building community identity. Following the plenary, attendees were generously welcomed to the historic Maryland Theatre for a reception featuring food, drink, music, and tours of the theatre's backstage area and projection booth.

The final event of the conference, the Maryland Historical Trust awards and reception applauded the exceptional work of preservationists from across the state. *(continued on page 4)*

Maryland Historical Trust Announces 2008 Preservation Award Recipients

The Board of Trustees of the Maryland Historical Trust (MHT) presented the 33rd Annual Preservation Awards at a ceremony on Friday, May 30, 2008, at Duffy's on Potomac in Hagerstown, Maryland in conjunction with Maryland's Annual Preservation and Revitalization Conference. Seven awards were given, including the prestigious Calvert Prize. A special citation from Governor O'Malley was presented to Howard Buchanan.

Howard Buchanan – *Governor's Citation* in recognition of Mr. Buchanan's years of service as the Chairman of the Canal Place Heritage Area Authority.

Charles L. Wagandt, Ellicott City – *Calvert Prize* for a lifetime of preservation including the rehabilitation of the historic mill village of Oella, service on the Friends of Patapsco Board of Directors and as a Trustee of the Maryland Historical Trust.

Catherine Ebert, Baltimore County – *Preservation Service Award* for the restoration of Prospect Hill, an early 19th-century landmark, and the founding of the Long Green Valley Conservancy in 1996.

University of Maryland Medical Center, Baltimore – *Preservation Project Award* for the restoration of Davidge Hall, one of the nation's oldest medical education buildings still in use.

Sharon Upton, Somerset County – *Preservation Project Award* for the restoration of the 1836 Jephtha Hayman House. Upton is a direct descendant of the home's builder, Daniel Benson and oversaw the complete restoration of the home, which has been in her family for more than 170 years.

EYA, Martinez & Johnson Architects, Hyattsville Preservation Association, and Prince George's County and Hyattsville officials, Prince George's County – *Preservation Project Award* for the rehabilitation of the iconic 1950s Lustine Center on Route 1 into a community center.

Montgomery Preservation, Inc, Montgomery County – *Educational Excellence Award* for their efforts to preserve the COMSAT Laboratories, a mid-20th century modernist landmark designed by Argentine-born architect Cesar Pelli, along I-270.

Heritage Tourism Alliance of Montgomery County – *Educational Excellence Award* for the Montgomery County Rural Heritage Byway Tour, a one-of-a-kind multimedia driving tour through the county's Agricultural Preserve.

AIA Spring Lecture Series Honored Michael F. Trostel

PRESERVATION MARYLAND CONTINUED ITS PARTNERSHIP WITH AIA Baltimore's Spring Lecture Series by sponsoring the Preservation Maryland Lecture in memory of Michael F. Trostel, FAIA. In addition to serving as an officer of the Board of Preservation Maryland for more than a decade, Mike Trostel restored more than 40 historic buildings, including the Third Haven Meeting House, the oldest building in Maryland.

Geoff Manaugh was the featured speaker for this year's lecture held in Falvey Hall at Brown Center of the Maryland Institute College of Art. Mr. Manaugh is the creator of the award-winning *BLDBLOG*, an editor at *Archinect: the Online Resource for Architects* and a senior editor at *Dwell* magazine. His lecture covered a wide range of topics including transportation infrastructure, ancient ruins, urban decline, and underwater archeology. With each topic, he discussed how the issue presented potential rewards and challenges not only to preservationists but to society as whole and provided opportunities for creative thinking on preservationist ideals.

Eastern Shore Summit Held in St. Michaels



More than 80 participated in the summit on May 16th.

In May 2008, Preservation Maryland, together with the National Trust for Historic Preservation, Maryland Historical Trust, the Maryland Department of Planning, 1,000 Friends of Maryland, and the Eastern Shore Land Conservancy, held a summit in St. Michaels to spark open conversation about the problems facing the Eastern Shore. Over 100 preservationists, property owners, elected officials, civic leaders, entrepreneurs, and others with an interest in the future of the Eastern Shore attended the summit and identified strategies for saving the historic and scenic character of this region, which is under tremendous development pressure.

The summit was funded in part by the Henry A. Jordan Maryland Preservation Excellence Fund and resulted in an action plan that will form the backbone of the new eastern shore field representative's work. Preservation Maryland, with support from a National Trust for Historic Preservation Partners in the Field grant, will hire a new field representative this fall.

Partners in the Field Challenge Grant Program

Preservation Maryland was awarded a three-year \$120,000 Partners in the Field matching grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation to provide field services to communities on Maryland's Eastern Shore. We have been making progress on this challenge and are now halfway to the \$120,000 goal of matching the National Trust's grant, thus meeting the deadline for the first of the three year commitment. In the fall, we plan to hire a new field representative and begin serving the nine counties that make up the Eastern Shore.

Tobacco Barn Restoration Fund Grants Awarded

In 2006, Preservation Maryland developed the Tobacco Barn Restoration Fund in partnership with the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the Maryland Historical Trust, the Southern Maryland Heritage Area, and the governments of Anne Arundel, Prince George, Charles, Calvert, and St.

Mary's Counties. The National Trust for Historic Preservation named the Tobacco Barns of Southern Maryland to its 2004 list of *America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places*. Recognizing both the importance of rural heritage in Maryland and the need for financial support, the National Trust, the Maryland Historical Trust, and Preservation Maryland have partnered to create the Tobacco Barn Restoration Fund. The purpose of the Fund is to promote the preservation and rehabilitation of Maryland's historic tobacco barns. Stabilization of endangered historic barns, including but not limited to roof repairs, timber repair or replacement, and foundation work. Work that preserves the historic character and materials of an historic barn. This effort has been supported by grants from the Maryland Historical Trust and from the *Save America's*

Treasures program, secured by Rep. Steny Hoyer. Thus far we've saved more than thirty tobacco barns across the region.

The Tobacco Barn Restoration Fund Selection Committee convened in June to award the final round of grants for this program. The committee was comprised of representatives from Preservation Maryland, the Maryland Historical Trust, the Southern Maryland Heritage Area, and Calvert, Charles, Prince George's, and St. Mary's Counties. The projects were evaluated on the cultural or historical value of the barns, urgency of the proposed work, visibility from the public way or public access, current agricultural use, and the appropriateness of the proposed treatments.

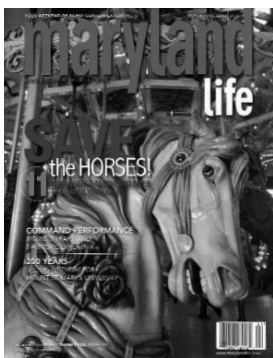

Endangered Maryland Nominations Sought



Preservation Maryland, in partnership with *Maryland Life* magazine, presents **Endangered Maryland**, designed to create awareness of some of the state's most threatened historic and cultural sites. Maryland has a rich and diverse heritage of historic buildings and neighborhoods, archaeological sites, communities

and cultural landscapes and traditions. Each year, demolition, vandalism, neglect, and inappropriate development claim treasured sites around the state. Once lost, they can never be replaced.

You can help. Put the spotlight on an endangered site by sending us your nomination. Sites will be chosen from across the state and the final Endangered Maryland list will be

published in *Maryland Life* magazine. Endangered lists have effectively focused public attention, and rallied together local residents, community organizations, civic leaders, and preservation professionals to help save a threatened site. The Endangered Maryland list is a statewide call to action. The final selection will reflect the diversity of Maryland's heritage of sites and traditions, and the threats facing them across the state.

Nominating Criteria:

- Properties must have important historic or cultural interest and be in extreme jeopardy.
- Properties must have a realistic prospect of being saved. Inclusion on the list should help increase this prospect.

Heritage Fund Grants Awarded

THE HERITAGE FUND SUPPORTS PRESERVATION PROJECTS AND ORGANIZATIONS through grants that are awarded for a variety of purposes—from emergency repairs to case studies—and range from \$500 to \$5,000. The Heritage Fund provides direct assistance for the protection of endangered cultural resources and promotes innovative demonstration projects that can be successfully replicated to meet Maryland’s historic preservation needs. The fund is intended to serve the needs of tangible cultural resources in Maryland that are not likely to be met through existing Preservation Maryland and Maryland Historical Trust programs. Along with historic sites, buildings, districts, and objects, projects benefiting archaeological resources are eligible for funding.

The **Anacostia Watershed Society in Prince George’s County** was awarded \$4,000 for rehabilitation to the **George Washington House, a circa 1732 tavern in Bladensburg**. The rehabilitation project consists of roof replacement, siding repair and replacement, painting, interior work, and sitework.

The **Anne Arundel County Trust for Archaeology at the Samuel Chew Home Site** was awarded \$4,000. The Samuel Chew House, constructed circa 1690, was one of the great mansions in the Chesapeake region but was largely forgotten after it was destroyed by fire in 1772.

The **Chesapeake Bay Watershed Archaeological Research Foundation in Talbot County** was awarded \$2,000 for a **Phase I archaeological survey along the Bay Hundred and the Miles River Neck** areas of Talbot County. Talbot County is home to the oldest recorded prehistoric and historic archaeological sites in Maryland.

Dickeyville Community Association in Baltimore City was awarded \$1,000 to assist with the cost of producing a **35-minute video documenting the history of the neighborhood**. Dickeyville is an historic mill village at the western edge of Baltimore City that dates to the mid-18th century and is a Baltimore City and National Register Historic District.

The **Jerusalem-Mt. Pleasant UMC in Montgomery County** was awarded \$5,000 for the **rehabilitation of the Cordelia House**. Cordelia House, which is located in the West Montgomery Avenue National Register Historic District (also a Rockville local historic district), was severely damaged by arson in 1999. Heritage Funds will be used for comprehensive interior and exterior rehabilitation work.

The Greater Mt. Zion Community Organization, Inc. in Baltimore County was awarded \$4,000 for the rehabilitation of the *parsonage at the Mt. Zion AME Church*. The parsonage, which was built in the late 19th century for a congregation of Mennonites, is a remnant of the historic African-American Community of Long Green. The building is a Baltimore County Landmark.

The Mt. Gilboa AME Church in Baltimore County was awarded \$2,500 for *replacement of the church roof*. While the congregation of Mt. Gilboa dates to 1799, the current church building was constructed in 1859. The church is individually listed on the National Register and may have been attended by Benjamin Banneker.

Save the Village in St. Mary's County was awarded \$2,000 for an *appraisal of the Carver Heights USO Building* near the Patuxent Naval Air Station featured on the 2008 Endangered Maryland list. The USO Building was constructed to provide African American civilian employees a place to meet and socialize from World War II to the 1960s. The remainder of the Carver Heights community has been demolished.

St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in St. Mary's County was awarded \$2,500 for the *restoration of the church's doors*. St. Andrew's, constructed in 1767, is an outstanding example of Georgian architecture and is listed on the National Register. The church has undertaken a major restoration program and plans to continue that effort with the restoration of the north doors.

The US Lighthouse Society in Anne Arundel County was awarded \$1,000 for the creation of an interpretive plan for *Thomas Point Shoal Lighthouse*, which is recently open to the public. The lighthouse, a National Historic Landmark, is a cottage-style screwpile light constructed in 1875.

St. Vincent de Paul Church Tower and Cross Restored

Built in 1841 and listed on the National Register of Historic Places, St. Vincent de Paul is the “oldest Catholic parish church in Baltimore.” During a storm in October 2006, the gilded cross that had stood on top of the of St. Vincent de Paul Church in Baltimore for 167 years had blown down.

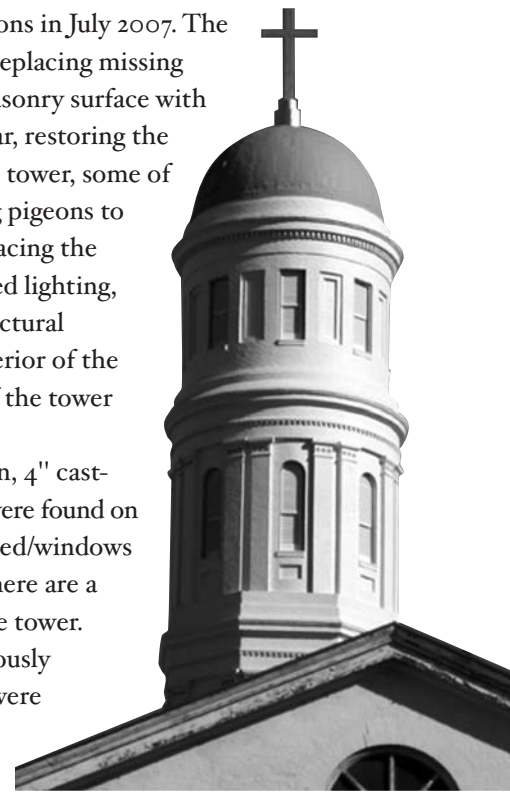
Fr. John Sinnott Martin, a pastor in the 1940s, once called the distinctive, three-tiered tower of the church “a finger pointing to God.” The tower without its cross was like a finger with a torn and bleeding nail.

The tower rises 150 feet above the street and is composed of three tiers. Each tier has eight, double-hung, louvered/ windows and is different from the tier above or below it. A set of 14 bells was installed in the first level of the tower during the Golden Jubilee Renovation in the 1880s.

The church made a commitment to replace the iconic cross and restore the tower and hired the firm of Murphy & Dittenhafer of Baltimore to draw up plans for the work. Keystone Waterproofing of Greensburg, PA was contracted

to complete the renovations in July 2007. The improvements included replacing missing bricks, repointing the masonry surface with historic lime based mortar, restoring the 24 louver openings of the tower, some of which had failed allowing pigeons to roost in the interior, replacing the gilded cross and associated lighting, repainting and other structural improvements to the interior of the tower. The restoration of the tower took five months.

During the restoration, 4" cast-iron, decorative rosettes were found on each side of the 16 louvered/windows on levels one and two. There are a total of 96 rosettes on the tower. These rosettes had previously been “painted out,” and were hence invisible. Now the rosettes, painted mint green, stand out.

Historic Rectory Threatened by Proposed Robotic Garage!

Preservation Maryland's headquarters, the c. 1795 Rectory of Old St. Paul's Church, is one of the last remaining Georgian architectural gems in the City and is surrounded by many notable 19th century buildings. It is now threatened by a proposed massive 92' high parking garage that will tower over the neighborhood and be located right next to The Rectory.

An on-going, four-year battle by neighbors against this project, this “Garage from Hell” (by its developer's own admission) and despite an earlier City determination that it was “the wrong thing in the wrong place,” this project's chances currently hang in the balance, despite numerous violations of existing laws and regulations. PM's Board has voted to help fund, if necessary, a legal challenge, should this outlandish proposal be approved by the City.

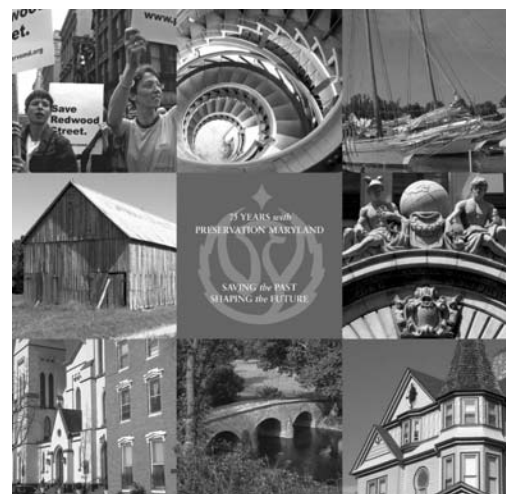
