Renovating a Historic Building


- Second floor had to be leveled and supported
 - Five inches up
 - New support beams
 - More new support beams
- ADA compliance
- Second floor, secondary egress nightmare
- Hint for Success - Hire an Architect with Historical Experience... Very Expensive... No Landmines




Embracing the History of the Building

- Oldest building in the town
 - Original beams hand hewn
 - 2nd floor beams cut marks
- Built in 1835 by the Owings family (of Owings Mills)
- 2nd fire department for the town
 - Found items
 - Pictures
- Parish House for St. Barnabas
 - Door sign
 - Visit from church members




Parallel saw lines are indicative of a



Utilizing the History of Sykesville




Gettysburg Connection


- A factor to the Confederate loss at Gettysburg was the tardiness General Jebb Stewart
- He was late to the battle because he was raiding Sykesville & the surrounding area.
 - He burned 2 bridges, ripped up railway and cut telegraph wires
 - My building was there...

 - Incorporate both into your tours



- To the Towns

About Dodon

1668 – Francis Stockett patent, named for French Convent

1725 – Purchased by the Steuart family

1890 – Donated to the Catholic Church

1926 – Family repurchased farm

1960 – Tobacco ends. Cattle and row crops begin.

1990 – Equine Training center

1999 – Agricultural preservation passed to 7 siblings

2007 – First vines

2018 – 400 acres woodland, 120 pasture & hay, 25 vineyard, four homes with 10 acres of farmstead





What did Claude mean?

- What is a “great wine growing region?”
 - Bordeaux/Napa – large, elegant estates
 - Burgundy/Sonoma – small, focused farms
 - Barolo - revolutionary learning
 - Mid-Atlantic – to be determined
- For Claude, “clever” means
 - Marginal ripening temperatures and excess water require us to be attentive to every detail, just to survive
 - These same conditions result in long, slow, balanced skin ripening that create balance, harmony, depth, longevity, and complexity
 - Focus on “living soils”




Diverse Rock and Gravel

Creating a Diverse Microbial Ecosystem in Soil

- Eliminating herbicides that reduce soil life by 85% in no-till systems
- Gentle tillage controls weeds, adds oxygen, renews bacterial life, and reduces fungal pest populations
- Natural products, such as crabmeal, and diverse cover crops enhance desirable microbial populations
- Offseason grazing reduces weed pressure, and adds organic fertilizer and bacteria

How a diversified system works

- Planting 28,000 grape vines attracts pests that like to eat grapes and grape vines
- Without crops that attract and maintain predators and parasites, the pests will take over
- Providing diverse food sources attracts mantids, lacewings, lady bird beetles, etc., that will reduce insect pests
- These diverse food sources will also help create diverse microbiological activity in soil that will reduce microbial pests





Creating a Balanced Insect Ecosystem

- Border plantings increase parasitic wasps
- Diverse wildflower corridors allow them to travel deep into the vineyard
- Summer forbs (clover) increases biological control of leafhoppers and thrips by 25%
- Alternate row mowing further reduces them by 50% within two weeks

What did Tim mean?

- Many of our challenges now are similar to those faced by Napa Valley growers in the 1960s
 - Workforce training and development
 - Novel climate and pests to understand
 - Vineyard management crews
 - Equipment supply and maintenance
 - Competing land uses
- A critical mass of growers with accumulated knowledge and experience and who are willing to come together to share it
- A community that comes together to learn, to enjoy wine and food, and to get to know each other
